
After nine years of being our church Sexton, **Sergio Conejo** has tendered his resignation. His last day was July 31.



## HOW MY FOUNDATION CONTRIBUTION IS BEING MANAGED

*The Foundation Committee oversees the monies and reports to the PCCR session. This committee is comprised of six church members who have financial backgrounds. Each member serves a three year term which can be renewed for one additional term. In addition to the committee, the 20/20 Visioning committee raises monies for the Foundation and is comprised of approximately twelve church members.*

*The Foundation assets are professionally managed in a diversified portfolio by First National Bank of Boulder. First National invest the monies with direction from the Foundation Committee. The primary investment goals are preservation of capital and capital appreciation. Currently, the assets are allocated to approximately 60% stocks and 20% bonds and 10% cash. Since inception in 2008, the fund has returned, after management expenses of 1%, an average of 9.96%. This is about 1.5% above the expected return.*

*Thanks to the generosity of the membership, in concert with prudent investment practices, the total Foundation assets are approximately \$927,000*

*In accord with the Foundation charter, monies may be used for any legitimate church expense except salaries. To date, approximately \$440,000 has been withdrawn from the Foundation for building maintenance and improvements. Examples of Foundation payments are carpeting of the sanctuary, painting of the church, new kitchen appliances, and organ refurbishing.*

*Whenever monies are requested, several controls are in place . The Session and the Foundation Committee approve the expense and two people sign the request to First National. As President of the Foundation, no monies are transferred without my written approval.*

*The church and the Foundation have just undergone a financial audit review. Thanks to our outstanding Financial Secretary, Carolyn Hull, I am proud to report that again, no deficiencies were found.*

*As you can see, your representatives have taken many steps to earn the trust of our membership. We will continue to be transparent and, to the best of our ability, be excellent stewards of the Foundation assets. If any member of our congregation has any questions or suggestions on how we can improve, please let me know. ## A Note from Mission

This year we are challenging our congregation to consider the question, “Who is a Missionary?” Each month we are highlighting a member of our congregation who is involved in the community and also a PC(USA) congregation that is trying new ways to be relevant to the world around them.

**Lisa Plaut** is a member of the **Mission Committee** and has just taken over responsibility for our **Just Coffee** sales. At the last Mission Committee meeting she spoke so passionately about her volunteer work at the Crossroads food pantry, we decided you should hear her story.

### What excites you about the Crossroads food pantry?

**Lisa:** *The exciting thing about working in the food pantry at Crossroads is that it allows me to see my community as an extension of our congregation. I see people all over our small town that I would like to help in small ways.*

### What made you decide this is where you wanted to dedicate your time and gifts?

**Lisa:** *I chose the food pantry because I like talking about food and nutrition. My nursing background helps me to assess the overall health of clients and dream up dishes they can prepare from things in our shelves, refrigerator and freezer. I also get to hear the stories of my neighbors.*

### How do you sense that God has called you to do this?

**Lisa:** *The people are the reason I volunteer at Crossroads. I remember, for example, a very young pregnant woman who was living for the winter with her skinny, jittery, boyfriend in a motel with another couple. She had a George Foreman cooker and a microwave – that’s it for cooking. The food pantry was a big help for her. As another example, during the Easter period, a woman came in needing assistance. She had traveled across country in a moving van twice. While our excellent caseworker, Eva Banuelos, helped the mother with her paperwork, four children popped out of the van. Happily, the kids were clean and well nourished, wearing sweatshirts, jeans and sneakers warm enough for a blustery Spring day. In her calm way, Eva gave them food and helped them to get to their destination in Ft. Collins. Crossroads made a difference for that family.*

### What would you like for others to know about Crossroads?

**Lisa:** *I have so many stories I could tell about making a closer connection to people and hopefully contributing something meaningful. Everyone deserves to be treated as a person of dignity and respect. Crossroads Mission Statement is “Practicing Christian love by providing basic human services to Estes Valley residents in need.” I see this every time I volunteer there.*

If you wish to learn more Lisa would love to share some of her experiences with you.



The second part of this article will highlight a church in Hammondsport, a small town (population less than 700) in the Finger Lakes region of New York. **First Presbyterian Hammondsport** is an even smaller church with a great big generous heart and a clear vision of their purpose. With a membership of 17 folks, only 4 of whom are below retirement age, this congregation’s vision is to be a vibrant, active, caring community of believers that others can join in service of God’s world. It is amazing what this tiny group of disciples accomplishes with the help of community recruits.

For many years the church has hosted the Diaper Depot where young families can come for support in raising healthy, well-adjusted children. So far in 2018 they have distributed 28, 886 diapers! The Diaper

Depot has expanded over the years to include needed supplies for seniors on fixed incomes. In addition, they host weekly Senior Luncheons through the Office of the Aging luncheon program.




The church also gives away over half, yes, over half, of their budget to local and world missions. Although they pray that God's plan is for their congregation to grow and prosper, they admit, however, in view of continued declining and aging membership that it may not happen.

They have decided to build a legacy of ministry in the community based on expanding their current ministry. They intend to build structures and coalitions that will insure that these ministries will continue on after the

current members can no longer lead or participate in them, and also beyond such time in the future that God leads them to cease being a congregation.

They are not giving up, but know that their ministry goes beyond the four walls of a building and is lived out through their hands and feet, Christ's hands and feet, in the world.



### Looking Back to Look Ahead:

#### A church timeline prepared by the congregation of the Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies

To better project what our church must look like in the future, the congregation will track significant events in our church's history and understand how they were related to changes in our culture, events in the world and nation, and events in the Estes Valley. It should become obvious that our church has evolved in concert with and response to all of these things. It will be easier to understand why we have come to be what we are. Then, when we can guess how the culture and events we are likely to be involved with will change in the future, it will be easier for us to plan our own evolution.

We will want to understand what the needs and desires of our community will be in the next 10 to 15 years, and how our church can meet the needs of our congregation and the wider community down the road.

We will **meet in Fellowship Hall at 4:00 on Sunday afternoon, August 5**, to fill in a timeline that starts several decades prior to the present time. We plan to chart significant events and changes in the world and nation, the Estes Valley, the culture of the times, our denomination, and our church, up to the present time. There will be opportunities to discuss possible timeline entries with groups interested in each of these topics prior to filling in the chart.

It is important to have wisdom from a very wide variety of people in this activity. Everyone in the congregation is invited to come, even if you want to just observe the process and join in the discussions. It will be interesting.

## GOLF OUTINGS

The Mission and Outreach Committee of PCCR is pleased to announce that our fund-raising golf outings will continue in 2018! For over 10 years, PCCR members Dr. Tom and Barby Nichol and many others coordinated a fund-raising golf outing to support the work of PC(USA) mission co-workers Dave and Sue Thomas, PCCR members who served with Presbyterian World Mission in México for over eleven years. Since returning to their home in Estes Park in 2013, Dave and Sue have coordinated the golf events. In 2015, a new event was successfully initiated: a miniature golf outing! Again this year, both the traditional golf outing and the mini-golf outing will be held on the same day — **Sunday, September 9**. Members of the Mission and Outreach Committee will be helping with registration and logistics for both events, and in some cases, will be playing in the golf outings as well.

Proceeds from both golf outings will again support PC(USA) denominational mission co-workers who serve with Presbyterian World Mission. Rev. Sara Armstrong and her husband, Rusty Edmondson, have been serving in Peru since 2009. Luta and Rev. Jeremy Garbat-Welch are serving in Malawi, Zambia, and Zimbabwe. Rusty Edmondson is planning to visit PCCR the weekend of September 8-9, to make a presentation following worship on Sunday, and to play in both the traditional and mini-golf outings.

Played on the 9-hole Lake Estes Executive golf course, the traditional outing will start promptly at 2:00 p.m. Golfers are encouraged to be at the course no later than 1:30 p.m. to receive a copy of the rules and some last-minute instructions. Entry fees for the traditional golf outing are: Individuals \$40; Couples \$75; Foursome \$150; Children ages 9 to 18 \$20. Rental of either pull or motorized carts will be an extra charge, payable to the golf course.

For the fourth year, the mini-golf outing will be held at the miniature golf course located on the grounds of the Estes Park Center-YMCA of the Rockies. The course is just beyond the tennis courts, on the left side of the entrance road. The mini-golf outing will begin with a “shotgun start” promptly at 6:30 p.m. Entry fees for the mini-golf outing are: \$10; Couples \$18; Children ages 9 to 18, \$5; Under age 9, no fee.

As in the past, there will be prizes in both events for the winning teams and special contests. Sign-up will begin soon, so please *SAVE THE DATE* of **Sunday, September 9**!



## Financial Update – Data Through June



Contributions to the church vary considerably from month to month, usually with a significant increase at year end. The monthly totals are especially volatile when the Foundation funds projects, such as in May when the Foundation contributed \$18,500 for painting of the church. This is reflected in the brown line, which shows actual revenues and reflects a typical pattern. The blue line is the average monthly revenue expected this year, based on the 2018 funding requirement of slightly over \$400,000, with the traditional increase in giving at the end of the year.

The first blue bar is the total revenue projected through June, based on the \$30,000 monthly average shown in the chart to the left. The next bar, in brown, shows total funding actually received through June, which includes a contribution of \$18,500 in May from the Foundation to pay for the painting of the church. The second blue bar shows total expenses expected if all budgeted expenses were paid evenly each month throughout the year. The final brown bar shows actual expenses incurred through June. This does not yet reflect the full cost of the painting, which will be reported after the final bill is paid in July.
