





Message from Pastor Christine Dempsey . . .

Dear Friends,

Fall is here! The Elk Rut! The cool crisp mornings! The firing up of the fireplaces! The changing of the leaves! It's fall when I start to think about coming together for Thanksgiving holiday and getting into the pattern of the school year. Here at Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies, fall is the time

when many of our beloved summer members return to their winter homes, our lawn becomes a favorite grazing spot for the animals, and our community returns to the permanent residents. It is that time when we feel that solidarity and that grit that comes with preparing for the winter months. I find it interesting that this is happening at the same time as the conclusion of our small group gatherings. I know that you are interested in my report and my suggestions as to how we might organize our steps forward.

In fall, we are reminded of the music of nature – the calling of the elk. It is perhaps no surprise that music is also the number one priority of the congregation. In the home visits,

music – organ, choir, and bells – was named as central to our identity and our faith. People understand music as an aid to their faith and it helps the Biblical message come alive. Knowing this, we will continue to work together to make sure that the music and the message work together, and we will think of ways to use music to enhance our experience of God. To continue our music ministry, we do not need to start from scratch but continue to build on the strong program that we already have.

Like the elk gathering, a second priority was for Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies to be a community hub, which means a center for non-profit organizations, concerts, and other gatherings. In addition to being a center for the community, people also wanted the church to go out into the community. They see their role as Christians to be in service of the community. However, many folks mentioned that they felt we could do a better job at this on both ends. The problem with having people come in and go out has been COVID-19 and the slow recovery from it. In terms of coming in, our groups are starting to return. We now host EPNRC, EVICS, Ballet Renaissance, Oratorio practice and concert, Chorale practice and concert, four Girl Scout groups, AA groups, and Summer Residents, to name a few. I am also getting requests for weddings and funerals. If you check on the placard in the entry way, you can see the groups meeting each week. In terms of

going out, I think this too has suffered from COVID-19. The mission committee, however, is starting the process of looking at how we can support the community as a church and has proposed making Bolt Bags for Crisis Advocates.

I have also learned that elk are highly social animals! And, like the elk, we are also focused on our social groups. It is therefore no surprise that the next major priority is the church society and our willingness to be an open and inviting congregation, a group that enjoys fellowship together, and a group that is wanting to care for one another. I have found this to be our

identity, but it is very important for us to continue to strive for openness with one another. One of the things that we do well is welcome visitors in worship, but I am curious if that is translating into welcoming new people into our broader fellowship. Right now, we don't really know. We will be returning to the friendship pads in the pews, so we can better care for those who are missing and reach out to those who are newly worshipping with us.

Finally, most of the groups mentioned felt strongly about reaching out to young families with children. We know that this demographic is missing in our congregation. The good news is that we have many wonderful ideas on

how we might begin reaching out to families again. This will not be an easy task or an overnight task, but I trust that God's church will grow. This is a long-range vision. First, we need to be ready for children. We are starting on this by adding a changing table in the women's restroom and children's worship aids, but this is only a beginning. Second, we need to have a program where we can invite and welcome children. We have a lot of ideas from a children's choir to a shortened VBS to an afterschool program, but right now, we are not offering programs for families. Finally, we will need to have church volunteers to make this happen.

Obviously, there were many more ideas and passions in these conversations, and I will organize them all into a spreadsheet so that we can make these choices together. There will be items that will be both low cost and easy to implement that will make a significant difference and other things will be high cost and high labor that we will have to think carefully about before we implement them. Still, I am so excited about all your energy, your dreams for our future and your passion as disciples of Christ, for "with God all things are possible." (Matthew 19:26) And with our elk friends surrounding us, we are ready to expect even the most unexpected.



Peace and Global Witness PEACE OFFERING REMINDER

On World Communion Sunday, October 1, our congregation will receive the Peace and Global Witness offering. Fifty percent of funds received are used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through projects of education and Christian witness. Mid councils retain 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. 25% will remain in Estes Park to support our own Restorative Justice partnership, which offers mediation, student circles, and community



conversations. Several PCCR members have been involved in Restorative Justice and agree that it does good peacemaking work in our town.

Denise Lord, the executive director of the Estes Valley Restorative Justice Partnership, will give a minute for mission on October 1 and be available in Fellowship Hall after worship to answer questions.

One of the reasons that I love being Presbyterian is the connections that I make with other Presbyterians throughout our denomination. It is so fun to join into an immediate conversation with others who share the same passion for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the jokes about being Presbyterian and the understanding of being a church that is reformed and continues to reform.



What many of you may not know, that in order to support our connectional church, we give money to the Presbytery every year. This helps support the operation of our church, helps support our church camp, Highlands camp and supports efforts to help seminarians and Commissioned Pastors continue their training. Right now, we give \$56 per member to support these efforts.

I know that when I started pledging out of my own earnings I was unaware of this connection and wanted to give separately to this specific obligation of the church rather than having the money come from my pledge dollars to the local church. So, if this is you, I hope that you will prayerfully consider a "per capita" pledge to the church to help support our broader denomination.

Greetings from the Warm Heart of Africa! It is indeed "warm" -- you may substitute "hot". Fortunately it cools down to the low 70s overnight and in our brick room with no heat and concrete floors it is even a bit chilly when the 5 a.m. rising bell sounds. The bell is actually at the Robert Laws Secondary School, but is heard all over the Station.

School started in earnest on Monday so I've been doing some individual speech therapy and teaching in several classrooms. Very gratifying when the class 7 teacher, Mary Mtonga, took avid notes as I put the kids through Preposition Mountain. Now I have to go back and we will tackle Prepositional Phrases. Form 1 English has been slow going. One or two are very quick to understand but the rest struggle with the most basic concepts. Most of 2 days this week were lost to meetings. One on

Tuesday with the school Board, teachers, support staff and PTA to discuss why student progress is so poor; the other a visit

from the Head of Station and the new area Chaplain. So it goes!

We have been to the open-air market and snagged some fresh peas and carrots-- veggies at last! Jim went to Mzuzu yesterday and came home with fresh strawberries, Chelsea rolls (kinds of a cinnamon roll) and corn flakes so we are eating like royalty! This morning we were at Primary School for Deaf to "help" plant the garden. Some of the seeds are from PCCR. Basically we watched while the older kids were instructed about what they should do, took pictures and tried to stay out of the way.

The power is beginning to flicker in preparation for the usual Sunday shutdown so I will close. Hope all is well in Estes.

PW Bible Study – October 16, 2023 Sacred Encounters – Lesson Two

All women of the church are invited to participate in the Horizons Bible Study, Sacred Encounters, on Monday, October 16 at 12 noon. The study will reveal the ways in which Jesus is present with people who live without the support of their communities due to rejection, confusion and fear.
