## **Message from Pastor Christine Dempsey**

Dear PCCR family,

Starting anything new is always a leap of faith, “Will I be good enough? Will I have enough energy? Will my efforts have any impact?” For me, this has been true over and over in my life. Of course, starting a new position as your pastor at PCCR came with many of these same questions, and I’m sure that you have had the same experience. These are questions that gnaw on all our minds and can even cripple us from making that leap of faith. Yet, this is exactly what Christ calls us to do as he calls us into service in the church.

As I felt Jesus’ call to send out my PIF in looking at a new position, I was also bewildered as I was serving a congregation I loved, working for a staff that brought me joy, and being in a position that was comfortable. I had trouble discerning why God was calling me to something different when I really was in a space I loved. I went into the office of the senior pastor, and I looked at him and said, “why now,” why this sense of call when everything is going so well. After all, I had just completed a mission trip with fifteen young adults, started a successful breast cancer support group, reorganized the long-term care team, and led a fun women’s retreat. Why now? And, my wise supervisor said, because you are ready, and God needs you somewhere else. And, here I am!

I have had so much fun this first month and a half getting to know you all, leading worship and helping you all dream. We have had about half of the small group gatherings, and I hope to have a full report for you by October. Thank you so much for your input! I have learned, if nothing else, that at least one member of the congregation will eat candy corn, that you are optimists by nature, and that you dearly love this church. Beyond that, we have many ministries and goals for this church that are on our minds. Here is our challenge. Feeling those needs in our hearts must be accompanied by that leap of faith that gives us the confidence to accomplish those goals. I want you to think about how we can accomplish the dreams that we have suggested. Are we willing to take a leap of faith? In my case, I could have easily stayed in my last position, but I came here on that confidence of Christ’s leadership, and now it’s our turn.

In thinking about this I am reflecting on the Apostle Paul and his encouraging message to the Romans. He says, “May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in faith so that you overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit” and then he goes on to remind us that we can welcome one another just as Christ has welcomed us in the glory of God. In other words, as our hearts are filled with dreams and hopes for our church, we need to trust that these will overflow into our actions. When Christ calls on our hearts, we need to respond not with “what” but with “how.” Your task this month is to pray about how Christ is calling you to action within this church, and your second prayer is to ask for the courage to do it. When we come together in the mission of God, we will surprise ourselves at the transformation that will take place in our hearts, our minds, our souls and our community.

# From Mountain Strong to Maui Strong



Here in northern Colorado, we know fire. We have come to expect the acrid scent of smoke every summer, irritating our throats and drawing water from our eyes. We know what it is like to have a wildfire burning nearby, to see the billowing plumes, to check Inciweb every morning, to live for weeks on end with cars packed and go-bags ready. We remember what it is like to drive through a canyon, darkened by smoke despite it being high noon. We have feared for our homes and grieved for our burned wilderness.

However, we do not know what it is like to wake from that dark day and find that one in ten of our friends or neighbors is missing or

gone, swallowed by the flames; while Estes certainly has seen loss, this valley has, by and large, been spared from the loss of human life through fire. And that is where our stories and Maui's stories diverge.

As I write these words, two weeks after the wildfires ravaged the historic town of Lahaina, over one hundred people have been confirmed deceased with up to 1000 still missing. Many are children. This cuts straight to our hearts.

As always after a disaster, we want to help. We want to hand-deliver canned goods and clothing and sleeping bags. We want to serve meals and set up cots and eventually rebuild. We want to hold and comfort those who have suffered the unimaginable loss of so many family members and friends.

But in this case, the disaster is so fresh and so far away that we can do nothing of that sort. So instead, we pray. We cry. We sing. We remember.

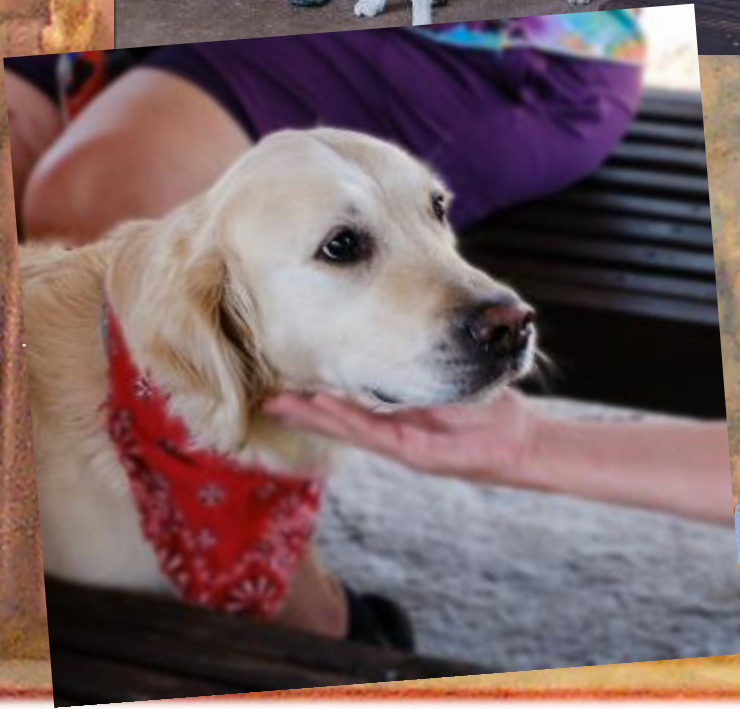
Worship on Sunday, August 20 at PCCR was dedicated to the people and land of Maui. Attendees wore leis and aloha shirts, bright flowing muumuus and flowers in their hair. An offering for fire victims was collected. The choir, passionately led by Rich Dixon, sang a hauntingly beautiful anthem of loss and devastation. In the sermon, Pastor Christine recounted her own story of visiting a church in Lahaina. Prayers were said, the island was remembered.

And at the end of the service, the congregation rose and formed a circle, singing "Hawaii Aloha," the state anthem of Hawaii. We held hands and gazed across the circle into one another's eyes, sharing this tender moment. Just as it is done in Hawaii.

## Thank You, Office Volunteers!

Early one Tuesday, the PCCR office phone rang. It was Dennis MacDonald, calling to report the online scam, a phishing email supposedly from Pastor Christine, attempting to get money from congregation members. He was the first to report the email. But I, the office administrator, wasn't at PCCR to receive his call; I was home taking care of my newborn. In fact, no one was at PCCR, no one except Brenda Gillum, one of our summer office volunteers.

This summer was an instance of creativity and generosity in action. Rather than turning to a temp agency or re-assigning my position, the PCCR Personnel approved the use of volunteer labor to staff the office. Thirteen selfless volunteers spent up to six hours per week at the Office Administrator desk, answering phones, greeting visitors, checking mail, and helping with various tasks. And, at least in this case, putting out (metaphorical) fires.

The morning of the fraudulent email, Brenda knew what to do. She immediately got the ball rolling to alert the congregation. Her quick thinking and action likely saved many of us from being scammed. This was one instance of quiet heroism, but there were many others. For instance, Peter Plaut assembled bulletins for May and June, as well as three newsletters, some even while recovering from knee surgery; Diane Palmer stuffed bulletins by hand each week; Terry Brigham compiled and emailed Session Reports.

## Crossroads Ministry

Far more than a food bank, Crossroads Ministry of Estes Park supports the people of Estes Valley in various different ways.

Once an individual or family is made known to Crossroads, the staff reach out with many hands. Food and toiletries come first. Clients needing clothing or household items may receive vouchers for the Village Thrift Store.

Occasionally Crossroads will assist with rent and utility payments, avoiding an eviction or utility shutoff. All clients are strongly encouraged to take the Financial Education class that Crossroads offers several times a year. There is now also career counseling and job-search assistance.

Notably, Crossroads Ministry makes an extra effort to reach out to two of the most vulnerable groups in this valley. Case worker Eva Bañuelos often assists recent immigrants who speak little or no English, while Jess Borries runs a food

program for Estes Park's homeless teenagers, a group that many people of this town do not even realize exists.

The Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies supports Crossroads financially on a regular basis. Additionally, the PCCR Mission and Outreach Committee collects non-perishable goods for "The Market" at Crossroads. So far this summer, we have donated over 48 pounds of food and 28 pounds of toiletries and paper products.

We all have something to share. If you can give food, look for the cart on the second Sunday of each month in the Narthex. If you can work a few hours a week, Crossroads utilizes volunteer drivers, office staff, and food pantry workers. If you have a few dollars that you could spare, their financial need is great. And if none of these ways work for you, then share whatever you have in whatever way you can; there are many ways to love.

## Chenoa Stock: Reaching Out to Peru

Chenoa serves in Peru as delegations and partnership coordinator, working with visiting PC(USA) delegations to foster partnerships with our Peruvian covenant partners, the Evangelical Church of Peru (IEP) and the Joining Hands Peru Network. Chenoa organizes, accompanies, and interprets for visiting delegations, helping to ensure that these visits reflect the mutual mission priorities of the partners. She sets up in-country logistics, assists in planning itineraries, and works with trip leaders and the communities that are visited by the delegations. Chenoa and her husband, José Luis Claire, have one son: Leandro Aiden. Since the COVID pandemic began, she and her family have been staying near relatives in the United States.





## Tyler Holm: *Serving Christ in Malawi*

Tyler is a lecturer in systematic theology, church history, and Greek at the University of Livingstonia, which is part of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP). Within the CCAP there is one ordained minister per 6,000 church members. Most of the students will be ordained as teaching elders and all will be future leaders of the church and Malawian society. The University of Livingstonia was established in 2004 and currently has approximately 200 students in its residential, distance learning, and masters' programs. Tyler emphasizes that his skills in teaching theology are built on an unwavering

passion to follow Christ's call. Tyler lives in Mzuzu, Malawi with his wife Rochelle and daughter Mphatso.

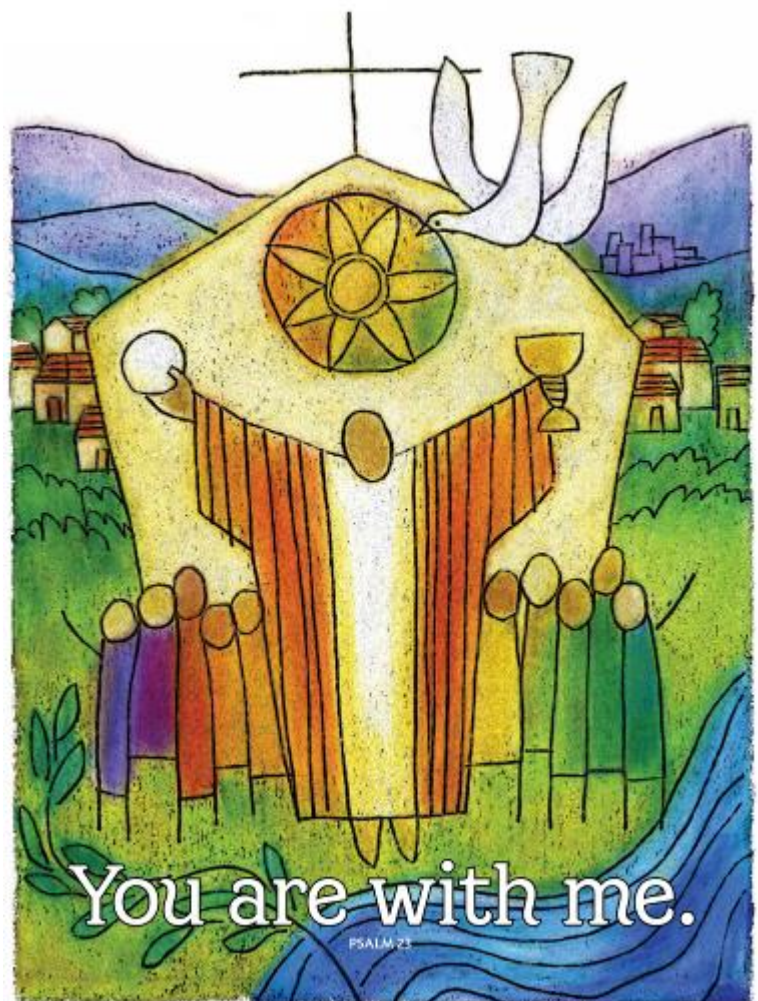
## Peace and Global Witness

Welcome to the Season of Peace, a four-week pilgrimage designed to deepen the pursuit of peace for congregations, families, and individuals. The Season of Peace culminates with World Communion Sunday on October 1, 2023 and receiving the Peace and Global Witness Offering.

Since 1980, PCUSA has used this offering to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. 50% of funds received are used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness. Mid councils retain 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 25% will remain in Estes Park to support our own Restorative Justice Partnership, which offers mediation, student circles, and community conversations.

Through the Peace & Global Witness Offering, congregations are encouraged and equipped to find and address the anxiety and discord that is prevalent throughout this broken and sinful world. Daily devotions called "Path of Peace Daily Reflections" are available for download on [PresbyterianMission.org](https://www.PresbyterianMission.org) Season of Peace website. You can also subscribe there to receive one in your inbox daily from September 3 to October 1. Check out the book and bible studies also offered there.

## World Communion Sunday: October 1st

We have a special Sunday planned for World Communion Sunday on October 1. World Communion Sunday is a chance to celebrate our Oneness in Christ with Christians throughout the Globe. This specific Communion Day first started in 1933 under the vision of Presbyterian minister Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr in Pittsburgh. In starting this tradition, he gave this gift of welcome and unity to all Christians. In celebrating this communion day, we will be taking an offering for the Peace and Global Witness Offerings, one of the four offerings promoted by the PCUSA. As a denomination, we can make a huge difference for people in need. 25% of this will stay with our congregation for work in our community, 25% goes to midcouncil mission efforts, and 50 % goes to the Presbyterian Mission Agency.

In order to celebrate this special day, we have bells and choir singing music from around the world, we will return to passing the communion plates and partaking in global breads, and we will pray for brothers and sisters around the globe. - ◆ Noted that Pastor Christine will be leading a Bible study on Mark in September.

- ◆ Heard an update from Building and Grounds committee on the effort to establish our property lines for tax purposes.
- ◆ Scheduled holding the church picnic at the church next year, because of rising costs at the Marina.

- ◆ Heard from Worship and Music committee that they are discussing ways to support Pastor Christine's vision of worship.

## Deacon Highlights ~ August 2023

- ◆ Deacons are grateful for generous donations from families for whom we have served memorial receptions
- ◆ Deacons provided one meal for an individual who had surgery and are in touch with other families who may need meals after hospitalization.
- ◆ Deacons are working on a policy regarding what we will serve at memorial receptions. We appreciate those who have helped us serve even though they are not currently deacons.
- ◆ Deacons are researching what is needed by Good Samaritan residents or others who may need rides to church or other assistance.
- ◆ Pastor Christine is planning to have a deacon retreat, possibly in conjunction with a session retreat in order to provide training and discuss issues related to our mission.


