Message from Pastor Christine Dempsey...

Dear PCCR family,

Happy New Year! This year like all that have come before, we have to remember a new number. If you are like me, you will keep dating checks with 2023 for a couple of months. I have even been known to slip back a couple of years. Yet, there is something truly awesome about the new year, 2024. This is the date that marks 2024 in the year of our Lord. Our "common era" dating system, the one we use every day, is based on the birth date of Jesus. When I think about this, it brings me joy and awe every time I write a date. I am sometimes truly overwhelmed with this, the promise that is embedded into each and every day.

As a historian that has a background in the ancient world, I frequently work in what are known as AD dates or CE dates. AD, as you know, is the abbreviation for the Latin Anno Domini (In the Year of our Lord) and CE is a secular version of the same time period meaning Common Era. Obviously,



people that lived in the ancient world did not have the birth of Christ at hand, so they had to rely on different dating systems. These systems focused on the date of a king. There was no standard dating system. With the birth of Christ, there was a new king. A king of all kings, Lord of Lords, and a new dating system based on his birth replaced the traditional king dates.

Of course, this did not happen immediately. It was first introduced by Dionysius Exiguus in the 6th century and eventually became adopted by not only the church but also the Western World and beyond. This dating system is imperfect as Dionysius did not know the exact date of Jesus' birth. Modern scholars believe that Jesus' actual birth was probably around 4 B.C., but the date stuck. Also, Dionysius did not have organizational principle for the events that happened prior to Jesus birth. It wasn't until the 8th century that the Venerable Bede would adopt the idea of BC dates or (Bene Christus, Before Christ). Bede tied the world before Jesus to the one afterward reminding us of God's creation and God's redemption.

I can't help but think about the beauty and hope in our world where our very day to day practice of writing a date is tied to Christ Jesus. Wow! Jesus came to restore hope, bring justice, establish peace, and champion love. Our dating system based on his birth should help us live into the promises that he brought to us. This makes my heart sing, and reminds me that with each year is a new opportunity to live as a citizen of God's kingdom once again.

As we enter another new year, let us rededicate ourselves to living as Christ taught us and continue to believe that our words and actions can make a change for the better. So friends, each time we write our new date, 2024, let us remember to add "in the year of our Lord, Jesus Christ." May this simple gesture be our guide and our prayer.

Assistance to Refugees Arriving in Denver

This year, Denver has received some 30,000 refugees from Central and South America. Most have come here from Venezuela. They are fleeing from dangerous conditions in their home countries and seek asylum and work here. They arrive with little and need help and asylum. Most have been sent here on busses from Texas.

Denver, on a per capita basis, has absorbed more refugees than other inland cities. The refugees are simply dropped off and left to fend for themselves. The random nature of this migration complicates the work to find shelter, and the cold winter weather makes it more important to do so. This compounds the problems of working with Denver's homeless population and has put a huge strain on Denver's budget.

The Mission and Outreach Committee has looked for a way to help. We decided to contribute to Lutheran Family Services, which has an active presence in assisting refugees coming to Denver. Lutheran Family Services is a faith based, nonprofit human services agency that, among a host of other activities, provides refugee and immigration services. The organization has been doing this work since 1948. We sent them \$1,000 in December. The money comes from an allocation to the Mission and Outreach program from pledges made by the congregation, and thus comes from all of us.

As noted in Matthew 25, verse 40, "whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."



Support for The Market at Crossroads

During 2023, our church collected and donated more than 500 pounds of groceries and sundries to the food bank at Crossroads, now known as The Market at Crossroads. This generosity helps relieve food insecurity for many in the Estes Valley. We plan to continue our efforts in the coming year. Collections occur on the third Sunday of each month when we put out our grocery cart. Look for it in the narthex. Crossroads tells us that their

main needs are for:

- Canned fruit, such as peaches, pears, pineapple and mixed fruit cocktail.
- Canned soups, especially chunky vegetable beef, chicken noodle, vegetable, lentil and chicken vegetable. Apparently tomato soup is not popular and Crossroads has asked that we not donate this item.
- Ramen noodles.
- Canned dinner items, including Dinty moore stew, canned chili, and beef ravioli.
- Salad dressings.
- For sundries, toilet paper.



Thanks to PCCR from Malawi

Last July, the Mission Committee asked for donations to buy blankets for the extreme poor in northern Malawi as well as for funds to provide a Christmas dinner for these same people. These two events were put together because the committee does not want to ask you more than once for such special offerings. You came through with amazing responses! Not only was money raised for the blankets, but extra was set aside for the Christmas dinner! We have just received a report from Mr. Leman Kayira about the blankets. Your gifts provided 164 blankets! 54 were given to orphans, 39 to senior citizens and 71 to widows and other vulnerable people. Mr. Kayira sent this note of thanks to each of you:



"The beneficiaries are very grateful for the donation of a blanket each which they received from the Presbyterian Church of the Rockies. The blankets signify great love and compassion toward fellow human beings.

Beneficiaries sincerely appreciate all the wonderful thoughts about them and the prayers being offered; they also sincerely appreciate the funds which you and the Mission Committee send to alleviate the great suffering. Their prayers are to you and all those who donate towards the funding. They know that it is only those people who

who are the servants of the Almighty

God, who can think of alleviating the suffering of others. May God bless you."

In a separate letter, Mr. Kayira asked for help with the Christmas dinner he and his wife provide for these extreme poor in his area of Chitipa, Malawi. Because you gave in July, the dinner will be held on Christmas Day and will be the only meal these people will have that day. He will serve about 200+ people with meat, greens, rice, red beans and nsima. If funds can stretch, there may be a boiled egg and even a Coke!

Things are very difficult in Malawi right now. Their currency, the kwacha, has been devalued by almost 70% in 2023. "... the kwacha has become a valueless paper for transaction. The sufferings of the people are visible everywhere. The plight is dire...."

The Mission Committee has sent your money from July (\$1000) to Malawi for the Christmas dinner. We have also sent an additional \$500 for food insecurity relief which will be used to buy maize at a cost of \$27 per 50kg bag. Each bag will feed a family of 4-5 for a month. Thank you for your generosity!

The most popular dish that day? The Marvin: one slice of French toast, thick-cut bacon, and berries. The following is an excerpt from a tribute that Marv's good friend, Rick Taylor, gave during the gathering.



He wrote that his birthright was to become a whole human being: complete, authentic, and grateful. He saw it as an opportunity.

He wrote of the Journeys class as being a paradigm shift for him. He thought of the class as a new

worldview, a work in progress, and a kind of spiritual conversion for him. A change of both mind and heart. He wrote that Char took great delight in believing and declaring that his experience with Journeys completed the loop of his life. I would add that Marv loved good questions. It is his legacy to us.

It is hard to separate Marv's birthday from the birth of the Journeys class. And so, let us all raise a glass to celebrate the birth of our friend and founder, Marvin Gee.



Women Forging New Paths

A Letter from Chenoa Stock, serving Peru

Dear friends,

On November 16, more than 30 people from around the U.S. and Peru, gathered virtually for the third and final (of the year) PERUSA South-North Dialogue Series, "Commitment to Gender Equality." Together we heard our Peruvian partners from the Evangelical Church of Peru (IEP) share their experiences of theological formation of women within their denomination's ministries.

Pastor Eduardo Arboccó, president of the Peruvian Joining Hands Network, gave an informative presentation about the history of the IEP. We learned that the formation of the IEP began with a small seed planted in the late 1800s by a Swedish

woman, Frederica Petersen, who simply wanted to create a space to teach the Bible to children in the Callao region of Peru. Soon after, other missionaries arrived and formally founded the denomination,

eventually naming its first Peruvian pastor. Though the IEP follows the Presbyterian structure for its administrative structure, it also recognizes the indigenous origins of the national population. Thereby, it uniquely mixes church doctrine with elements of its indigenous culture to carry out the important work of its mission and church in a communal way. Unfortunately, throughout the growth and development of the IEP, there are not many official written documents with the names and great works of women leaders and missionaries of the church. Eduardo's hope is that one day, the IEP will formally recognize and write the stories about the women who played such an important role in forming and strengthening the denomination.

Though there is still work to be done in acknowledging women in the past, thankfully, our IEP Peruvian partners lift up and empower women in the church through their present-day ministries within the Cuzco region of Peru. We heard about these ministries from Pastor Santiago Condori, director of the IEP Sicuani Seminary, and Pastor Leopoldo Aguilar, director of the Sajiruyoc Bible Institute, that offers a 12- module course for women leaders who cannot go away to seminary. Both the seminary and the Bible institute's course for women are spaces where women can study the Bible and learn how to be confident leaders in the church. While they cannot become pastors, many women who graduate with theological certificates and diplomas from these institutes and courses are now working with churches and offer their gift of ministry to Sunday Schools, the IEP Women's Leagues, congregational pastoral care, or leading worship and even preaching.

We then heard from Yanet Aedo and Yovana Grajeda, two women who shared their first-hand experiences of the transformation that has happened within them, personally, and with their families, as they take the

course for women leaders with Pastor Leopoldo. While learning more deeply about God's love and the Bible, they have made friends, improved their relationships, become more involved in the church, and discovered a new confidence in their gifts and abilities. We will celebrate with them when they graduate on December 28!

Finally, to complete our series and tie together the theme of women empowerment and religion, we invited Yenny Delgado to speak. Yenny is a dual citizen of Peru and the U.S., a psychologist and theologian, activist, Elder of the Bethesda PC in Maryland, Director of PUBLICA Theology, and convenor of Women Doing Theology in Abya Yala. We learned that Abya Yala is the unified name to represent both North America and Latin America. It is a way to remove names of colonial divisions and speak of one land. Yenny spoke of her work with Women Doing Theology as a process of communal work that seeks to empower women by calling them into reflection. This reflection is ecumenical, theological and intercultural, and looks to recover the ancestral stories and traditions that celebrate the diversity of indigenous women, while also recognizing their shared roots. It is also a call to mobilize into action to liberate the invisibility and challenges of women and recognize their important role in the church. This is reflection and work that requires "Abya Yala Theology" – theology that embraces, listens to, and learns from ancestral traditions and stories in order to create a new church with greater women participation and leadership.

It was a thought-provoking time, to say the least. We are looking forward to reflecting on this series and preparing more South-North dialogues for 2024 so we can continue to learn together.

Another item on which I am reflecting and preparing is discerning my role as a mission co-worker while continuing to serve from the U.S. After conversations with my Peruvian colleagues, Presbyterian World Mission, and my family, it was decided that the best path forward for my ministry with our partners and for my family is to continue to serve remotely from Cleveland. The pandemic created a lot of change in our lives and world and one blessing amidst those changes is that we have learned to intentionally relate and engage in partnership, even when not in person. I will continue to accompany our Peruvian partners in their ministries, act as liaison between U.S. churches and our partners, and be faithful to my role as a mission coworker, as I have been the past 18 years. It will be a transition. It will be different. It will be new. For all of us. But I trust that God's Advent Spirit of preparation will be with us as we walk the path of discernment together.

I give thanks for the women who call on their ancestral stories to create new and empowering stories in their lives, for our partners who understand that partnership knows no boundaries, and for you all, who encourage me daily through your prayers and words of support. I have grown in faith in each of the four countries I have served and will continue to do so as I now discover a different part of Abya Yala and what it can teach me while walking with our partners in Peru.




Bible Study with the Pastor


Journeys

RECONNECT SCIENCE AND RELIGION

TO ENHANCE OUR SENSE OF THE DIVINE AT WORK IN AN EVOLVING UNIVERSE

Christianity (and any other spiritual path) must be in an honest conversation with science if it is to be relevant in the 21st century. The scientific method emerged as the best tool we've found so far to help us answer the question, "What is real?" Yet even our best scientists sense that there is something inherent in the fabric of the universe that is beyond what they can observe or measure. They would say that whatever is pointed to by the mystery we call God must be intimately involved in the evolutionary processes of nature, consciousness, culture, and social systems. Using the video series *Painting the Stars*, produced by the Living the Questions group, Journeys will explore this mystery and attempt to reconnect science and religion to enhance our sense of the Divine at work in an evolving universe.





Journeys will also start a series of programs about sacred spaces. A sacred space can be either a time or a space, it can be something we consciously create or something which spontaneously arises, where we experience a depth, richness, and sense of meaning that usually escapes us in fast-paced everyday life. Simply put, a sacred space brings one uniquely close to God.

Journeys meets Sunday mornings in the Church library. Gathering begins at 8:15 a.m., with the program starting at 8:30.



Session Highlights ~ December 2023

- ♦ Heard from Hospitality Committee that they will be serving hot chocolate and cookies following the Christmas Eve service on Dec. 24.
- ♦ Noted that the separation of the Membership and Hospitality committee into two individual committees will be effective January 1, 2024
- ♦ Approved the updated Employee Handbook from Personnel committee.
- Clarified the liability impact for members who provide transportation for other members. If it involves transportation to/from a church-related event, our insurance would provide coverage in the event of an accident or other claim. If the transportation is not for a church-related event, the church insurance policy would not provide coverage.
- Heard a report from Sue Yowell and Jim Nussbaumer that at the recent Presbytery meeting, Commissioners approved having Highlands Camp enter into a conservation easement arrangement with the Estes Valley Land Trust. This plan will provide tax benefits to Highland Camp as well as protection against commercial development.
- ♦ Re-scheduled the January 2024 Session meeting to January 22 because of the Federal holiday (MLK Day) on January 15.
- Re-scheduled the February 2024 Session meeting to February 29 to be held during the Session/Deacon retreat.
- Voted to approve the 2024 proposed budget. Pledges are still coming in to the office, so all figures are not yet final, but will be in place by February 4 at the Annual Meeting.
- ♦ Reviewed the Terms of Call for Pastor Christine Dempsey. These will be voted on by the congregation at the February 4 Annual Meeting.
