Message from Pastor Christine Dempsey . . .

Dear Friends,

June is Mission Month! During the entire month of June, we will be celebrating our mission partners here at the Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies. Most of us see mission as the outreach of the church, but mission in our tradition has much more weight as it reflects to all that we do as followers of Christ. The *missio dei* or the mission of God is our response to all that we do in our lives in word and act to honor God. After all, God sent Jesus to us that we might be reconciled to God, and this invites us to be fully alive and active in God's kingdom.

There are many ways that we can be active in the mission of God. As Jesus reminds us in Matthew 25, our call to mission is to be the hands and feet of God. We do this when we feed the hungry, offer the thirsty something to drink, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, heal the sick and offer companionship to the imprisoned. In other words, our mission is action! Our call is to be in and with our community, offering what we can to all in need.

One of the biggest challenges in our Christian history has been to identify how we can best be "helpful." Sometimes what we think someone needs and what they actually need are two different things. Therefore,

when we do mission work in the community, we seek out mission partners who have dedicated their time and expertise to a specific need. We call them "partners" because we work alongside organizations that are making an impact in our community and our world. To highlight that work of our partners and to help you all see how we respond in word and action, we are featuring one of our partners each week in a 2-3 minute "Moment for Mission."

Jerry was assisted in this work by a happy crew that included Jim Nussbaumer, Jeff and Sandy Lindberg, Kent Meyer, and Peter Plaut who formed a "bucket brigade." Jerry first provided a demonstration for the crew as to the safe and proper way to touch and carry an organ pipe, then all helpers donned white gloves to protect the pipes. As Jerry removed each pipe, it was handed to one of these helpers who carefully passed it along to the next helper -- on and on until the pipe was carried out of the enclosed pipe chamber at upper right rear, down a narrow ladder, through the lower chamber filled with wind reservoirs and equipment, and out through the lower door of the pipe chambers. Then, at the last step of this hand-to-hand process, our fearless sentries cautiously packed the pipes into large, flat, wooden shipping containers, bound for the AR Schopp Organ Factory in Ohio.

Organ Maintenance

Jerry Akers, our organ technician, came to the church on May 14th to remove the Oboe stop from our pipe organ. The 61 pipes of this stop, now 42 years old, are showing (or sounding) the ravages of age and heavy use. In recent time, these pipes have been difficult-to-impossible to tune and regulate, and a growing number of the pipes refuse to produce sounds at all. Consequently, it has become necessary to remove the pipes of this stop and send them to an organ factory for restoration.




This complicated process of rebuilding the Oboe stop will take several weeks, and when the pipes finally return to PCCR, another eager crew will reverse the process until the pipes are seated once again in the pipe chamber, ready to be voiced and tuned by Jerry Akers. In the meantime, Jerry is hoping to be able to add to the organ's computers a temporary digital Oboe so that our organist doesn't have to try to sing the oboe parts of his music. Stay tuned.

This organ project is being funded through gifts to the organ fund.

PCCR EAST DRIVEWAY CONSTRUCTION UPDATE



The contractor took up all of the old asphalt in early May. Paving started on May 8 and was finished on schedule, on May 19. Unlike asphalt parking areas which can be driven on a day or two after placement, concrete, being a structural slab, needs several weeks to reach its designed strength of 4,000 pounds per square inch. By the time you read these words, it should be sufficiently cured as to be drivable.



Upcoming Sermons

Their next ministry chapter is as full-time mission workers for Communitas International, joining a management team cosponsored by the Scottish Network of Churches offering church planting and next-generation leadership training, called Launch, for Scotland-based and international participants. COLUMBARIUM

The Church's Columbarium is located in the northeast corner of the church property. It is along the Church's Meditation Trail overlooking Fish Creek. The Columbarium was established in the mid-1980's as a final resting place for the cremated remains of PCCR members and families, and friends of PCCR upon recommendation of the Columbarium Committee and approval by Session. The Columbarium site includes both in-ground and wall crypts. The Columbarium is connected to the Church's Outdoor Chapel by a pathway and includes the Catherine Emslie O'Neill Memorial Shelter. Entrance to the Columbarium is marked by a memorial sign at the lower driveway into the Church property.



The Columbarium Committee is made up of the Pastor and PCCR members. The committee oversees maintenance and the ordering of markers and urns and schedules and attends inurnments. The Committee also works with the Church's Financial Manager to pay costs and monitor funds.

Members of the Committee are Bill Smith, Chairman; Bill Solms, Session Representative; Verlene Thorp, Member; Brian Rood, Member and Pastor Christine Dempsey, Pastor. Funeral Planning

Our funeral policy at PCCR

This is part 5 of my series on remembering well and planning a funeral.

This is the final installment of my funeral planning series, and in this last letter, I want to address our funeral policy here at PCCR. I believe that hosting a funeral in the church building can be one of the most beautiful ways to remember a loved one, especially when the Sanctuary is the church home of your loved one. Over the past few months, the Worship and Music Committee here at PCCR has worked hard to renew our funeral policy to best serve our congregation.

For our church family, there is no cost to use the Sanctuary or the Fellowship Hall. Funerals are usually held in the late morning on weekdays Monday-Thursday, but other days and times can be scheduled with the exception of Sunday. However, we do have fees associated with staff. People outside of our church family are also welcome to have a service here, but there are more substantial fees involved with using the Sanctuary.

In terms of the service, I use a traditional outline for a "Witness to the Resurrection" as written in our Book of Common Worship. However, this can be modified to include special music or friends to speak on behalf of your loved one. Sometimes I am asked if we can have a funeral from a different faith tradition. I am happy to involve family and friends of other religions in the order of the service, but the primary focus in the Sanctuary needs to be Christian. Also, as your pastor, I am truly honored to preside at funerals and am willing to incorporate other clergy if desired.

The time after the service is also important, and our deacons can provide a beautiful dessert reception. While there is no cost to our church members for the reception, it is helpful to the deacons to give them a donation for their work. Another option is to have a meal catered in the Fellowship Hall. This is an important time to share stories about your loved one, and for many, is the most important part of the day.

Friends, I pray that this series has helped you think about remembering well. Please find a time to sit down with me and talk remembering the wisdom from Ecclesiastes, "for everything there is a season, for everything there is a time."

Gratitude, For the Opening and the Closing

During the past year, and especially over the last few weeks, I have been watching River begin to use her hands. She has learned to touch and grasp and finally manipulate objects; she can shake a rattle, press keys on a piano, scribble with crayons, even eat with a spoon. These feats are no small miracles!

However, before she was able to accomplish these tasks, another miracle had already occurred, although it went by unnoticed, nearly invisibly. Before she could close her hands, she had to open them. Like all infants, River was born with hands that generally stayed clenched in fists. Over time, those fists relaxed and opened so that her hands could feel, hold, and change the world around her. She had to let go in order to receive.





Letting go. That is the antithesis to holding. And as in most dualities – gain and loss, growth and decline, birth and death – one is visible, the other less so. We celebrate and encourage the side that we see as "good" while shunning and trying to avoid the "bad" side. However, of course, they are two sides of the same coin and any increase in the incidence of Heads can only, in the long run, equally increase the incidence of Tails.

But that is all heady philosophy. What does it mean for us? This month, the Community of this church will open its hands to release River and myself from the work of PCCR. You will then have empty hands to welcome Brenda Dixon into the role of Office Administrator. This is the dance of life. Opening and closing and opening again, just as River's tiny hands can now do all day long.

And so we thank you. Thank you for opening your hands to our family. Thank you for touching our lives and holding us with integrity and love. Thank you now for gracefully opening your hands to let us go.

Alcoholics Anonymous: One Day at a Time

Editor's note: in October 2023, we were approached by a kind gentleman who was hoping to begin an AA Group and needed a place to meet. PCCR has traditionally hosted AA Meetings, but since the covid pandemic, that group has been absent. With Pastor Christine's approval and support, they began meeting in Room 6 twice a week. We are grateful to be able to provide the space for this group of people doing important work. The following is from their leadership.

Our new Alcoholics Anonymous group was looking for a home for its meetings. What better place than at the Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies, since our program is based on recovery, spirituality, and belief in God as we understand Him.

When we inquired about reserving the space, we were welcomed with open arms by Pastor Christine and Office Administrator Meredith. We now walk into the front door and are often greeted by wonderful music played by the organist, which sets the tone for our meetings.

We are a fellowship of people who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others recover from alcohol. AA is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, or organization, does not wish to engage in any controversy, neither enforces nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics achieve sobriety.

Our leaders are but trusted servants who do not govern. The group is diverse with people of various ages, from their early 20s to their 80s and is flourishing in large part because of the wonderful home we have for our meetings and that we welcome everyone who is addicted to alcohol and drugs.

Our meetings are held on Tuesdays and Thursdays at noon downstairs in Room 6. Please feel free to join us if you think you may have a problem and are looking for help.



Presbyterian Borderlands Ministries

Presbyterian Borderlands Ministries (PBM) is a binational organization of seven ministries, five of which are located along the US-Mexico Border, from Arizona to Texas, and from Sonora to Tamaulipas. PBM engages with a wide variety of people in communities on both sides of the border – young and old, "properly" documented and "differently" documented, rich and poor, conservative, progressive and in-between – and welcomes people from all faiths to join in ministry together.

In PBM, ministry partners from the Presbyterian Church (USA) and Iglesia Nacional Presbiteriana de Mexico (National Presbyterian Church of México) focus on establishing and cultivating relationships between people in order to be more faithful in the quest to be disciples of Jesus Christ.

Compañeros en Misión (Partners in Mission)

Compañeros en Misión is based in the sister cities of Nogales, Sonora and Nogales, Arizona—or as they are called in Spanish, *Ambos Nogales* (both Nogaleses). While its primary mission is new church development throughout the Mexican state of Sonora (under the jurisdiction of the Mexican Presbytery of Chihuahua), Compañeros en Misión actively supports asylum seekers at the border through their food ministry. Congregations currently include Sol de Justicia (Sun of Justice) in Nogales, Sonora; Voz del Desierto (Voice of the Desert) in Hermosillo, Sonora; and a congregation in Caborca, Sonora called La Hermosa (the Beautiful).

Frontera de Cristo (Christ's Border)

In Douglas, Arizona and Agua Prieta, Sonora, <u>Frontera de Cristo</u> engages in a broad range of ministries that include partnering with a drug and alcohol rehab center, a women's co-operative, and a fair-trade coffee co-operative (<u>Café Justo</u>, from which we obtain the coffee sold at PCCR); providing health services and a children's enrichment ministry; hosting binational internships and mission delegations; and building relationships with law enforcement, elected officials, business persons, other faith organizations, academics, and human rights groups to work toward a healthier border for all. They also partner in ministry with Lirio de los Valles (Lily of the Valley) Presbyterian Church and two migrant shelters, Centro de Recursos para Migrantes (Migrant Resource Center) and Centro de Atención al Migrante "Exodus" (Exodus Migrant Assistance Center). Together with Café Justo and the drug rehabilitation center called CATPSIC, Frontera de Cristo helped to sponsor and build Café Justo y Más, a neighborhood coffee shop that offers a safe haven from the drug culture.

Pasos de Fe y Esperanza (Steps of Faith & Hope)

Pasos de Fe y Esperanza, located in Ciudad Juárez, Chihuahua, focuses its ministry in Colonia Guadalajara. Their multifaceted outreach to their community includes but is not limited to health clinics, a children's ministry, classes for empowering women to start businesses, and hosting deportee families.

Puentes de Cristo (Christ's Bridges)

<u>Puentes de Cristo</u> is based in Hidalgo, Texas. Its mission is to extend the gospel of Christ to bridge communities of faith and to facilitate the exchange of information and education between peoples along the U.S./Mexico border and other international communities. Puentes de Cristo hopes to promote mutuality in mission and engage in ministries of compassion and justice.





La Última Milla (The Last Mile)

The mission of Presbyterian Church Shelter "La Última Milla" is to support the community and expand development opportunities for the population of Ciudad Juárez, Chihuahua, through assistance services such as daycare, shelter, and a community kitchen, and training to improve the quality of life. The shelter provides accommodation for women and minors and provides food, basic medical care, and legal orientation to the public.

Centro Jubileo de Chiapas (Chiapas Jubilee Center)

The mission of the Jubilee Ministry of Chiapas is to accompany, in a comprehensive manner, the lives of Mexican and foreign families in this border-mountain part of the Mexican southern state of Chiapas, in addition to accompanying churches that do not have a pastor, especially in the mountains of Chiapas.

Tucson Borderlands Young Adult Volunteers

The mission of the Tucson Borderlands YAV program

is to transform the lives of young adults by inviting them into God's work of justice and peacemaking in the borderlands. The program is focused on building relationships and community on both sides of the U.S./Mexico border to confront barriers of racism, geopolitics and xenophobia that exist in the borderlands. The YAVs also seek to provide a multi-level response to how barriers in the borderlands particularly harm immigrant communities to help broaden the wider church's response of welcoming migrants. The YAVs are committed to the humanitarian work of organizations and churches in the borderlands that welcome immigrants and refugees. They accompany organizations and the church in the long-term work of helping immigrants integrate into communities with respect and dignity through housing support, nutrition, community-building and employment.

Thank You PCCR!

The Mission & Outreach Committee has received a thank you letter from Marion Medical Mission, one of PCCR's supported ministries.

"Dear Friends in Christ:

Thank you for your gift of \$1650. Marion Medical Mission will use 100% of your donation as designated. Marion Medical Mission is different...because of what we do together. We are involved in the IMPOSSIBLE!

In 2023 over 400,000 people in Malawi, Zambia, Tanzania and Mozambique got a sustainable source of safe water because of MMM's Well Program. 4280 wells were built covering roughly 60,000 square miles. ... 400,000 people got the message Christians in the United States shared the love of Jesus with them."

The goal for 2024 is 4000 wells...built for an entire rural village for a cost of \$475."

PCCR's gift was designated for 3 wells in 3 rural villages with an extra amount added for administrative costs.

Members of the PCCR congregation have served, and continue to serve with Marion Medical Mission in Africa as part of the volunteer teams which go yearly for 3 or 6 weeks. They do not dig wells, but serve as ambassadors in Christ as they visit wells and join in the celebrations of clean water.

Just Coffee /Cafe Justo WHY?

Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies offers coffee produced by Café Justo for sale, and beginning in June, will serve it at fellowship. There are reasons for doing this beyond that this is simply good coffee.

Migration – Café Justo is a coffee-producing cooperative. Members grow the coffee in the southern Mexico state of Chiapas. The cooperative roasts, finishes and packages the whole and ground beans in its own facility in Agua Prieta, which is on the Mexico side of the US-Mexico border, across from Douglas, Arizona. The cooperative was started in 2002, so the growers and their families could stay home and not be compelled to migrate north to the United States to find employment.

Presbyterian connection – Frontera de Cristo, a Presbyterian border ministry, provided a loan to fund the coffee roasting and packaging operation in Agua Prieta. Our church is one of many Presbyterian churches that purchase and resell Café Justo's coffee. We do so at cost, both to provide an excellent coffee and to support the cooperative in giving its members meaningful and fair employment within Mexico.

A green and organic product – When cultivated the traditional way, coffee plants are grown under the shade of large rain forest trees in a way that replenishes the soil, without use of chemical products. Café Justo does not use pesticides or herbicides. The plants are fertilized through complimentary trees and natural processes. The coffee is hand-picked and sun-dried on paved patios. The coffee is certified as USDA Organic.

Boutique coffee – Café Justo's coffee is mountain-grown, hand-picked, sun-dried, and not blended. These attributes result in consistent flavor that is never bitter or acidic, smells as good as it tastes.

Fair Trade PLUS – Café Justo is a cooperative where its members own the business and control the entire chain of growing to roasting to packaging to shipping the product. There are no middlemen.

The Difference is in the Roasting – Roasting is the king of the value-added process in the coffee market and makes more money than comes from growing the coffee. When the cooperative roasts and packages the coffee, those profits remain in the community and all of the production stays in Mexico. The coffee is shipped north, but the workers do not have to migrate away from their families to have good jobs.


Groups and Events
