Hymn Tidbits

#449 - "My Lord! What a Morning"

My Lord! What a Morning is based on an African-American spiritual, translated by Dr. Raquel Mora Martinez (2020). She was born in 1940 and is a well-known composer and arranger of Hispanic songs and hymns. She has degrees from the Univ. of Texas-El Paso and Perkins School of Theology as well as the School of the Arts, Southern Methodist Univ. She served as editor of the official United Methodist hymnal in Spanish (1996). She is a composer, teacher, church musician, and hymnal editor, and celebrates 70 years in music ministry. Born in Allende, Mexico, she began playing the piano in her congregation at the age of seven. Her father was a Methodist minister and her mother, Amada Mora, devoted all of her time to church service. Raquel served in a variety of capacities in Texan Methodist congregations. A popular clinician at all levels of Methodist gatherings, including organist in San Antonio at El Buen Pastor UMC. She has held visiting professorships in Hispanic hymnody. With her husband, United Methodist Bishop Joel Martinez, she prepared Fiesta (2003), a compilation of bilingual worship resources. She received an Honorary Doctor of Music from Nebraska Wesleyan Univ. in 1997.

#543 - "Abide with Me"

Abide with Me (1847) is by Henry Francis Lyte (Ednam 1793-Nice 1847). He was educated at Portora (The Royal School of Enniskillan), and at Trinity College, Dublin. He abandoned medicine for theology, and took Holy Orders in 1815, his first curacy being in Wexford. He then moved to Cornwall where he experienced a great spiritual change due to the death of a fellow brother clergyman. In 1823 he was appointed Perpetual Curate of Lower Brixham, Devon. He published 3 volumes of poetical works. He wrote this hymn as he was dying from tuberculosis. Scripture refs.: St. 1: Luke 24:29, Ps. 27:9; St. 2 James 1:17, Ps. 102: 26-27; St. 3 Rom. 16:20; St. 4 Ps. 27:1, 1 Cor. 15:55; St. 5 2 Peter 1:19. The text was published posthumously.

According to some sources, William H. Monk (1823 London-1889 London) wrote Eventide for Lyte's text in ten minutes. Monk is best known for his music editing of Hymns Ancient and Modern (1861, 1868, 1875,1889). He also adapted music from plainsong and added accompaniments for Introits for use throughout the year. He became choirmaster at King's College in London in 1847 and was organist and choirmaster at St. Matthias, Stoke Newington. He composed over 50 hymn tunes and edited The Scottish Hymnal (1872) and Wordsworth's Hymns for the Holy Year (1863).

#404 - "Precious Lord, Take My Hand"

Precious Lord is by Thomas Andrew Dorsey (Tommy). Many hymns are conceived in the throes of tragedy. "Precious Lord" was written in Chicago in 1932 following the death of Dorsey's wife Nettie and infant son during childbirth. Dorsey (1899-1993) was born in Georgia. His father was a Baptist preacher, and his mother a piano teacher. Known as the "Father of Black Gospel Music," Dorsey combined African American church hymns with blues and jazz. This "worldly" combination was not without controversy at first, but set the tone for gospel music for decades to come. Born in Villa Rica, GA, Dorsey was reared in Atlanta from the age of five, where he came into contact with the musical sounds of the blues. He moved to Chicago in 1915 and studied at the Chicago College of Composition and Arranging and began playing in nightclubs. He put together the "Wildcats Jazz Band" to play for Ma Rainey in 1925. After the death of his wife and son, he remembered an old pentatonic melody from his Sunday School days, "Maitland" by George Allen (1812-1877). Arranging this tune and adding his own words, "Precious Lord" became the most famous of his many gospel songs. Scripture refs. are Matt. 8:23-24 (the storm); Ps. 23:4. (the valley of the shadow); and the symbolic Jordan River. The final yerse echoes the Good Shepherd in John. Dorsey was the first African American elected to the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame and the Gospel Music Assn.'s Living Hall of Fame. Fisk Univ. houses his archives.
