Message from Pastor Christine Dempsey . . .

“Rejoice in the Lord always, say Rejoice” Philippians 4:4

I always loved September. It is the birthday month for mother and my grandmother, and I always looked forward to the celebration, a special tea party where we used the fancy cups and saucers that belonged to my grandmother. Each set had a different flower on it representing the months of the year. I always looked for my birthday flower, June. Using it at the party made me feel included. The event marked a time of sharing together and remembering family stories. What I loved most about these gatherings were the stories about how my grandmother received the plates. This was the story about family, about her big sisters, who gave her only one piece a year. This was all that they could afford. The cups and plates were gifts from the heart, gifts that encouraged gathering and reflected sacrifice.

Just as my aunts gave these place settings from their hearts, we too are called to give to the church from our hearts. For most of our lives, we think of the times we give in terms of bills, fees, or duty. The church is different, for when we give to the church it is out of love and gratitude.

It reminds me of the occasion of my grandmother’s birthday where the giving of the gift was an opportunity to celebrate and as time went on, the gifts turned from individual items into place settings of welcome and remembrance. The gifts turned into an occasion for gathering and telling stories. My aunts knew that in giving from their hearts they were building our family.

This September and October, we will be focusing on stewardship in our church, and indeed it is a time for gratitude. As you plan your giving this year, think about this family, think about the stories of laughter and tears, about plates of welcome that invite others to join us, and about how we are called to “Rejoice in the Lord.”

Is peace on earth possible?

PCUSA certainly thinks so! Through its annual Peace & Global Witness Special Offering, the church seeks to "sow the seeds of peace" locally, nationally and globally. We are encouraged to work together as congregants to be peacemakers and pursue justice and the common good that Christ wants for everyone. After all, peacemaking is key to the Gospel and the mission of the church. Gifts to the Peace & Global Witness Offering will offer solutions for more of God's people to live in freedom and dignity.



50% of this offering supports Presbyterians seeking reconciliation around the world.

25% of this offering goes regionally to Presbytery and Synod.

25% of this offering stays with PCCR to directly support local efforts to bring peace and justice to Estes Park

Your Mission and Outreach Committee has selected Estes Valley Restorative Justice Partnership (EVRJP) as this year's local offering recipient. EVRJP helps build and repair relationships-- whether working to repair the harm of a crime, bringing parties together to work out sustainable solutions, or providing proactive support to build community connections and promote positive decision-making. It is a local peace-making organization that offers justice-based programs with courts and police, school-based programs, community mediation, and community conversations with the Estes Valley Library. EVRJP is the perfect group to receive 25% of our collection.

Let's help our denomination and EVRJP fulfill the prayer, "God of all Creation, bring Justice and Peace to our World." Amen.

The Mission and Outreach Committee recently received this letter from Chenoa Stock, one of the mission co-workers supported by PCCR. Chenoa works in Peru, but recently has been in the States and doing her work virtually. She seems to have enjoyed her time on the ground recently with the people of Peru!

Dear Community Presbyterian Church of the Rockies,

I hope this finds you well and enjoying your summer. I still can't believe August is almost here! I write to send my deepest gratitude for your continued and long-term support of our partners' ministries that I accompany in Peru. I, thankfully, spent some time in Peru this month, reconnecting with those partners and learning more about those ministries.

I visited the Evangelical Church of Peru (IEP)'s Sicuani Seminary, whose students were on winter recess; but where the Director, Pastor Santiago Condori, and the professors, continue to reflect on how to improve the seminary campus and classroom experience. They have plans to continue the ongoing construction of the boys' dormitory and are hoping to add one more floor to that building. They are also dreaming of building a multi-use auditorium where they can hold graduations and other denominational events throughout the year, without worrying about the wind or rain ruining or blowing away the tarp they currently use. They are an inspirational group – even with their minimal resources, they were able to raise money for some of these projects and continue to pray and search for funding for the auditorium.



I also traveled with a visiting youth delegation and met with a few Joining Hands partners. We traveled to La Oroya in the mountains to meet with the youth environmental committee of Filomena Tomaira Pacsi. We learned from them about the ongoing environmental issues there, due to heavy metal contamination. We also worked alongside their youth to plant trees and paint a mural at their local school.

We then went from the mountains to the coast to learn about the most contaminated river in South America, the Chillón River, in the city of Callao. We met with partners who live in Marquez, a coastal village that is affected by the industrial and human pollution of the Chillón River, and also by the waste of the Pacific Ocean. They are working with local authorities and national allies to advocate for laws that protect the waters and their health.

It was a wonderful time to hear directly from our partners and have them remind me how much your support and prayers mean to them as well. So thank you from all of us for your faithful commitment to God's inspiring ministry through our partners in Peru.

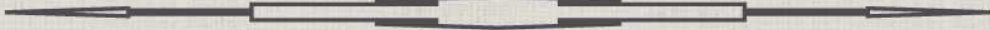
Frequently Asked Questions

Is the coffee from Café Justo a medium or a dark roast?

The roast refers to the amount of time the beans spend in the roaster. Everybody seems to ask for a dark roast coffee, and in response, everything we order from Café Justo is dark roasted for both the Robusta and Arabica beans. Also, a dark roast results in less caffeine in the coffee than does a medium roast.

What's the difference between Robusta and Arabica?

Robusta beans produce a stronger and more bitter flavor, with more caffeine than Arabica. Robusta coffee has a little less than twice the caffeine of Arabica. Arabica is sweeter and smoother. The coffee served in Fellowship Hall on Sundays is brewed from the Arabica bean. Arabica is also used for decaffeinated coffee. Both the ½ and ½ and fully decaf coffee that we sell is made from the Arabica beans.



An Opportunity to Visit Frontera de Cristo

Frontera de Cristo is the US/Mexico border ministry that helped establish Café Justo. Frontera de Cristo celebrates its 40th anniversary this year, and in October will host a weekend of fellowship, education and ministry in Agua Prieta, on the Arizona – Sonora border. This is where Café Justo has its coffee roasting operation.

In 2019, Kent and Betty Meyer along with Dave Thomas went to Agua Prieta for a similar weekend workshop offered by Frontera de Cristo, entitled *Responding to an Exodus: Gospel Hospitality and Empire*. Betty writes this about her 'wonderful' trip: "While there, we visited Café Justo roastery and packaging plant, from where our Sunday morning coffee is shipped. A celebratory feast with entertainment was served one night in the street between Café Justo and the local Presbyterian Church. We ate another meal at the Migrant Resource Center, worshipped at the border wall and in a couple of Mexican churches. We learned a lot about the migrant crisis and what we followers of Christ can do about it. It was quite educational and meaningful. I recommend going and seeing for yourself what is happening at the border."

PW Bible Study – September 16, 2024 *Let Justice Roll Down*

After our introduction to the new Bible study, *Let Justice Roll Down*, at the luncheon Monday, September 9, Presbyterian Women will meet for their first circle meeting the following Monday, September 16 in the church library. We will gather at 11:30 a.m. for a brief social time, with the lesson beginning at 12 noon. Because the meeting occurs during the lunch hour, you are welcome to bring a sack lunch to eat during the meeting. The PW Circle meets each month, from September through May on the third Monday of the month. In September, Pat Waltermire will lead us through lesson one titled "Environmental Justice" based on passages from Ezekiel. In the introduction to the study the author states, "We are called to care for creation because the earth and its members belong to God, but also, crucially, because a healthy creation sustains human well-being." We hope you can join us for this timely study.

Journeys

Journeys is a "community of faith-travelers" working toward building a fellowship that supports each person as they seek spiritual wholeness. The discussions cover a broad range of topics. All are welcome.

Adult Sunday School



Have you ever wondered how the church developed within the context of the Roman Empire? Questioned why we have so many denominations? Wondered about the origins of our liturgy? If so, come and join us at 8:30am in the lounge in the months of September and October for an overview of Church history taught by Pastor Christine.

September 8: History as fact? History as Memory?

We will examine why writing about the Early Church and why the “history” of the Early Church is hard to reconstruct.

September 15: “The Underground Church” The Early Church during an age of Persecution

We discuss how the church was able to grow even though the Roman leadership would often persecute Christians. What promises did hold that made it unique and made it grow?

September 22: The Official Church and the Decline of the Roman Empire

The church becomes official under the Emperor Theodosius (yes, not Constantine), and we will look at how the church was able to sustain identity and organization in the wake of a deteriorating Roman Empire.

September 29: no class (Pastor Christine will be joining the Journeys class in a discussion of the Lord’s Supper.

October 6: Eastern Church/Western Church

As the Roman Empire fell, the former territory divided into the feudal kingdoms of western Europe and the Byzantine Empire in the East. We will study the schism in the church in 1054 that led to Western Christendom and the Eastern Orthodox tradition.

October 20: The Medieval Church

Since our heritage as Presbyterians lies in the Western Church, we will look at the development of the church during the Middle Ages. We will tackle the Crusades, the Inquisition and even the Muslim/Christian conflict in what is now Spain.

October 27: The Protestant Reformation

Our last class of this series will focus on the protestant Reformation and a look at the reasons why and how the Medieval church would split into numerous denominations.

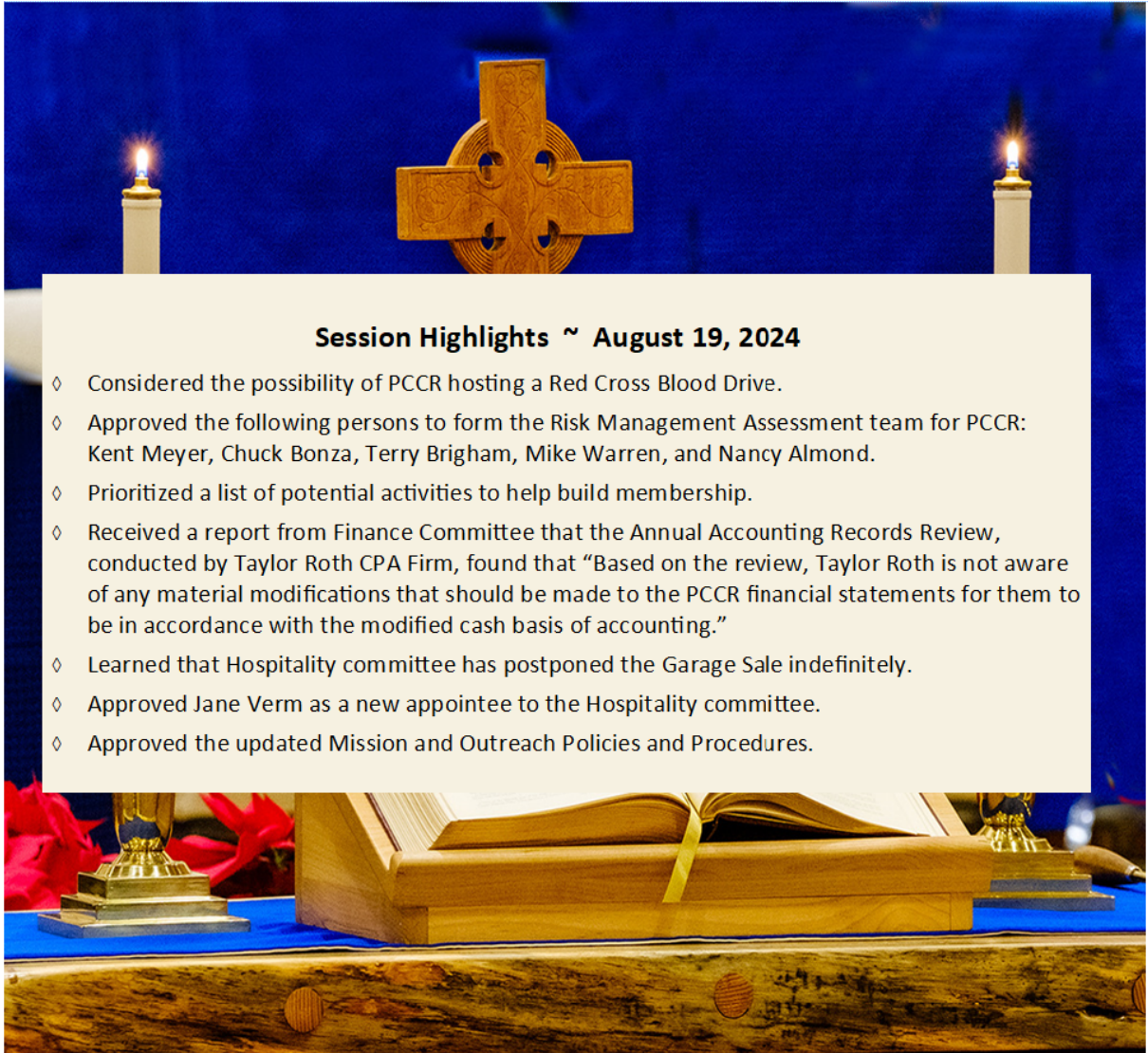
