Hymn Tidbits

#457 - "I Greet Thee, Who My Sure Redeemer Art"

I Greet Thee is attributed to John Calvin born Jehan Cauvan (1509-1564), influential French theologian and pastor during the Protestant Reformation. He was a principal figure in the development of the system of Christian theology later called Calvinism. Trained as a humanist lawyer, he broke with the Catholic Church around 1530. After religious tensions provoked a violent uprising against Protestants in France, Calvin fled to Basel, Switzerland, where he published the first edition of his 40-volume Institutes of the Christian Religion in 1536. That year he was recruited by William Farel to help reform the church in Geneva. The city council resisted their ideas, and both men were expelled. Calvin proceeded to Strasbourg where he became the minister of a church of French refugees. He continued to support the reform movement in Geneva and was eventually invited back. Calvin was influenced by the Augustinian tradition, which led him to expound the doctrine of predestination and the absolute sovereignty of God in salvation of the human soul. The Reformed, Congregational, and Presbyterian Churches look to Calvin as the chief expositor of their beliefs.

#543 - "Abide with Me"

Abide with Me (1847) is by Henry Francis Lyte (Ednam 1793-Nice 1847). He was educated at Portora (The Royal School of Enniskillan), and at Trinity College, Dublin. He abandoned medicine for theology, and took Holy Orders in 1815, his first curacy being in Wexford. He then moved to Cornwall where he experienced a great spiritual change due to the death of a fellow brother clergyman. In 1823 he was appointed Perpetual Curate of Lower Brixham, Devon. He published 3 volumes of poetical works. He wrote this hymn as he was dying from tuberculosis. The text was published posthumously.

#280 - "Amazing Grace"

Written in 1773 by English poet and Anglican clergyman, John Newton (1725-1807) who was conscripted into service in the Royal Navy. In 1748, a violent storm battered his vessel off the coast of County Donegal, Ireland, so severely that he called to God for mercy, a moment that marked his spiritual conversion. It bears the message that forgiveness and redemption are possible regardless of sins committed, and that the soul can be delivered from despair through the mercy of God. The last verse was first recorded in Harriet Beecher Stowe's 1852 *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. The tune New Britain appeared in Southern Harmony, Wm. Walker's 1847 shape note book and then became iconic during the Civil War and on the Cherokee Trail of Tears.
