CENTERING PRAYER (Unison)

LIGHTING OF FOUR ADVENT CANDLES

FIRST CANDLE

Leader: The first candle we light to remember that the newborn Jesus came to us in the darkness and the cold. In the eerie silence of the night and the landscape of abandonment, Jesus came.

God reminds us that even in the worst of circumstances when we are consumed by grief or exposed and lonely, that God can wrap us in everlasting hope.

SECOND CANDLE

Leader: The second candle we light is to remember that Jesus did not come into the world alone. God did not just make him appear in that dark night but surrounded him with loving parents. On this night when we feel alone, may we be comforted by the people in our lives who have been present for us, those people who nurtured us, those people that were here even when everyone else was gone.

But God, when memories don't suffice, help remind us that we are never alone in you. You hear our prayers, you comfort our souls, love us unconditionally. Let us lean into this faith that you have rooted in us that we might find peace in this winter time.

THIRD CANDLE

Leader: The third candle we light when we do not know where to go, when we have lost direction. Many of us who had once outlined a clear path now find ourselves in the regret of life. Perhaps illness, or necessity, death or tragedy changed our life's trajectory.

But, we are reminded today about the light, the star that gives us direction. This is the star that alerted the shepherds and guided the kings. When our path seems murky, it is Jesus who is the Christ who gives us guidance and assurance in this life that God has given us.

FOURTH CANDLE

Leader: The fourth candle we light as a sign of hope, the hope that the Christmas story offers to us. We remember that God, who shares our life, promises us a place and time of no more pain and suffering. It is a reminder that the light is spread from one candle to the next—it is the light of Christ. It is the light of the World.

When Jesus tells us that he is the light of the world, we are reminded that it is through Jesus that death has no more hold over us. Just as the light takes over the darkness so does the promise of Christ who reminds us that in him there is no darkness at all.
