Message from Pastor Christine Dempsey ...

Dear friends,

One of the most important religious and historical sources from our tradition are the 10 commandments. They are the cornerstone not only of Judaism but also Christianity. And, yet, we as Christians sometimes have trouble understanding the relationship between Jesus and these early instructions. This upcoming July, I am going to look at the law, in particular, the 10 commandments, and ask us to what extent these laws have bearing on our lives as Christians. We know that Jesus said. "Do not think that I have come to abolish



the Law or the Prophets, I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them," (Matthew 5:17) but we also know that Jesus said, "I am the new Covenant" (Luke 22:20). So does the Law matter in our Christian world? We will seek to answer that question and others. For example, did you know that the 10 commandments are not the same in the different occurrences of scripture? Did you know that many of the commandments parallel "rules" by other ancient peoples? Did you know that scripture tells us of 2 sets of stone tablets containing the 10 commandments?

Beyond these interesting questions, I think more people wonder if the 10 commandments are binding on Christians. Afterall, we might question whether the Old Testament still has bearing on our lives as, it might seem, that the New Testament has replaced it. Nineteenth- century Biblical scholar Friedrich Schleiermacher believed that Christians should not use the Old Testament at all as Christ had come to replace it. In his view, Christians only needed the Good News of the Gospel.


Yet, here we look at this quote by Jesus wondering if that criticism about the Old Testament is misguided. The answer is, yes, For we recognize the broad arc of scripture and God working through creation from the beginning to the end and that God's creation is good and that God has always sought reconciliation with us. It is a recognition that God's being is constant, unwavering and desirous of a relationship with creation.

As we start this journey through the 10 commandments, let us remind ourselves that Jesus preached the greatest commandment which is to love our neighbors as ourselves. This statement by Jesus sets the tone for how these 10 commandments can shape our relationship with God and one another. When we love God, we put aside our own needs and wants and concentrate on living in harmony with God who gives us life. And then, we can work on loving each other and creating a world where we live in harmony.

Friends, I am looking forward to this month of worship and study.

PCUSA Global Ecumenical Partnerships

Our denomination, Pres byterian Church (USA), has been making many changes to its international mission agency. One major change is the name of the agency. What was previously known as **World Mission** is now called **Global Ecumenical Partnerships**, a new form of engagement in God's mission around the world. Under World Mission, our denomination's Mission Co-Workers were sent to other countries at the invitation of in-

country partners and served alongside those partners as co- workers. It was a model of doing God's mission in mutuality, rather than a paternalistic and colonial approach that had prevailed in international mission work for many decades.


Through the years, Presbyterian Community Church of the Rockies (PCCR) has supported many Mission Co-Workers who were assigned by the denomination's World Mission agency to serve in various countries. PCCR members Dave and Sue Thomas served as Mission Co-Workers in México from 2001 to 2012 and are now both retired from World Mission. More recently, PCCR has been supporting Mission Co-Workers Chenoa Stock (Peru) and Rev. Tyler Holm (Malawi). All of our denomination's Mission Co-Workers have ended their service in 2025, as The Interim Unified Agency, formerly the Presbyterian Mission Agency and Office of the General Assembly, has restructured World Mission to become Global Ecumenical Partnerships. Some former Mission Co-Workers are now working in this new form of global ministry.

Instead of having Mission Co-Workers assigned worldwide, PC(USA) now has Global Ecumenical Liaisons (GELs) and Young Adult Volunteers (YAVs) engaging in life-transforming ministries in 80 countries (including the USA), working with partners worldwide who help us understand issues in their local contexts. Through these GELs, PC(USA) is collaborating with other faith traditions at home and abroad, engaging with leaders and communities to discern and respond to the call of the Holy Spirit in today's world. The GEL assigned to our regional synod, the Synod of the Rocky Mountains, is Rev. Princeton Abaraoha.

In many respects, "the world has come to the U.S." as there are diaspora communities of multiple nationalities spread across the United States. In addition to many people from Latin America (México, Colombia, El Salvador, Guatemala, etc.), there are also communities from Southeast Asia, former Soviet-bloc nations, various countries in Africa, the Middle East, and many other places. These people bring their Christian faith with them to our country, and PC(USA)'s Global Ecumenical Partnerships will seek to do God's mission with these groups as part of its "inward- focused" ministry. The "outward-focused" portion of the restructured agency will continue to foster mission partnerships at scattered locations around the globe.

Exciting news! The new security system is up and running at PCCR!

An Update from Mr. Kayira on the Gift of Blankets:

I'll impact on the lives of beneficiaries and the communities.

- 1. The intervention has resulted in improved health and well-being in the targeted households. The blankets are providing warmth and comfort, reducing the risk of illnesses like pneumonia and malaria: and improving overall health in pregnant women, children, the elderly and people with disabilities amongst others.
- The blankets have enhanced dignity and self worthiness to the beneficiaries as most of them are often segregated and suffer from stigma and discrimination. They are often forgotten and marginalized.
- 3. The activity has restored hope, reminding them that they are not alone and that there are people who care for them.

Here are a few testimonials from the beneficiaries:

- ."I have been struggling to keep myself warm at night, but now I have a blanket which keeps me warm and protected. Thank you ." Gogo Phiri said.
- ." The blanket has brought much joy and comfort. Now am able to sleep like a baby. I do not dose during lesson in class anymore: because during the night I have enough sleep," said Dembire Mughogho.
- " I have been warming by covering myself with a torn and worn out cloth. During the night, I have been married to fire. But now, I have a nice blanket from the Good Samaritans," said Nyagondwe.

We are deeply grateful for your support to the Blanket Distribution Project. Your funding has made tangible differences in the lives of beneficiaries and the project is honored to have you as partners in order to serve the most vulnerable people.

The future plan is to continue providing essential items like blankets to other vulnerable individuals. I would like to acknowledge and appreciate your trust in the project. Please receive our heartfelt thanks: and may God bless each one of you.


